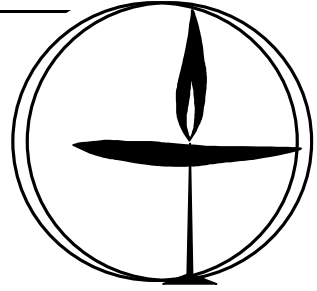

## MINISTER'S MUSINGS

### Happy New Year!

Welcome to 2016! In our tradition of choosing a word for the upcoming year (introduced to us by Adrienne Martini some years ago), I am choosing the word “Change” for 2016. Cheryl and I have some exciting changes planned for the year (more on that when the plans are more finalized—but trust me, you'll find them exciting, too). I am committed to reaching my weight loss goal this year, which means I'm making some changes to my daily routine. (I'm going to lose another 10% by July—and I'm stating it publicly here so you can all help me stay accountable to the goal.) And there will be changes taking place at UUSO, too. The Committee on Ministry has been working hard to become a TRUE committee on the WHOLE ministry of the congregation. In May, they will be making these changes official by proposing changes to the by-laws regarding their purpose and procedures. In the meantime, they will continue to make suggestions about how we can work better together on our shared ministries. Some of those suggestions will lead to experiments. Some of those experiments will work—others will not. The best way to grow (in wisdom, and possibly in size) is to keep trying new things and learning from those experiments. So, let's greet these experiments, these changes, with an openness and eagerness. It's going to be an exciting year!

### Theme-Based Ministry

Many Unitarian Universalist congregations across the country have successfully moved to a practice of Theme-Based Ministry. Throughout the year, they choose themes to focus on throughout the church. The themes are addressed in the worship services, in Religious Education, in adult programming, in newsletter articles, and in whatever other shared ministries that are appropriate. Congregations have found that theme-based ministry increases participation in church activities across the generations and encourages people to engage with the topic in a deeper, meaningful way. Our Committee on Ministry has strongly urged us to try Theme-Based Ministry here at UUSO. So, we'll be experimenting with the concept in the coming year.

Every quarter, we'll choose a theme to explore and engage in. This first quarter, I've chosen the theme, “Finding Our Path.” I'll be preaching on that theme on February 7 (and it might show up in other worship services along the way). Director of Religious Education Susan Ryder will be incorporating the theme into some of the Religious Education classes this quarter. I'm hoping the Small Group Ministry groups will take the theme as a topic for their groups some time during the next few months. But—there are more ways to engage the theme—and for that we need YOUR help. If you have an idea of how the congregation could explore and engage with the theme of “Finding Our Path,” I want to hear from you. Perhaps you could host a discussion or arrange for a particular movie that fits the theme. Maybe a series of presentations from members of the congregation about how they found their particular path. The possibilities are limited only by your creativity and your willingness to help us with this ministry. Ideally, I'd love to have 2-3 people volunteer to help coordinate programs for this theme for this quarter. (With new volunteers each quarter.)

Since this is a shared ministry, I won't be choosing the next theme—WE will. If you have a suggestion for a theme for the next quarter, let me know. Suggestions that come with ideas on how the congregation could engage the topic will be given greater weight. Suggestions from people planning to volunteer to coordinate will be given the greatest preference. Let's see what UUSO can do with Theme-Based Ministry in the coming year.

### Sawdust from the Board

Happy New Year UUSO! On behalf of the Board of Trustees, we wish for all of our members and friends the growth that comes from building, seeking, and reaching (the three active verbs in our Mission).

In December, the Board took the following actions:

1. We approved a charge for the Endowment Committee to start a new Endowment for the sustainability of UUSO into perpetuity.
2. We approved a proposal of a new model for re-establishing the Personnel Committee. We modified the Board's "no officers are paid" policy to allow for a stipend to be paid to the Treasurer.
3. We thanked Paul Carter (appointed temporarily for John Bagby) and Virgil Briggs (resigned) for their board service and welcomed Sandy Smith (elected but unavailable until now).
4. We reviewed the first draft of a Fundraising Policy and agreed to further discuss it at the January board meeting.
5. We are seeking two more people to appoint to the Finance Committee.
6. We reviewed two items from the Sounding Board.
7. We decided two building rental requests.
8. We reviewed and support the grant application to NYSCU by the Social Action Committee to have an anti-war speaker come to UUSO.

Our next board meeting is Wednesday, January 20, 6:30 pm in the sanctuary. Members and friends of UUSO are invited to observe. Board members are always happy to listen to your concerns or suggestions and two board members will be present at the "Sounding Board" table after the service on January 17.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

### Our Flaming Chalice



*A flame within a chalice (a cup with a stem and foot) is a primary symbol of the Unitarian Universalist faith tradition. Many of our congregations kindle a flaming chalice in gatherings and worships and feature the chalice symbol prominently.*

*Hans Deutsch, an Austrian artist, first brought together the chalice and the flame as a Unitarian symbol during his work with the Unitarian Service Committee during World War II. To Deutsch, the image had connotations of sacrifice and love. Unitarian Universalists today have many different interpretations of the flaming chalice, including the light of reason, the warmth of community, and the flame of hope.*

January Sessions have begun in Religious Education at the UUSO. Each year at this time, all ages from grades K-12 join together with guests from our congregation and community to share in workshops around a common theme. Rev. Craig also interweaves this theme into adult worship services. As you may have already guessed, this year's theme is: "Our Flaming Chalice."



We'll learn about the history of the UU Chalice and explore what the light of a chalice means to each of us. We'll have many opportunities for activities, conversations, games, projects, delicious snacks, and time together with new and old friends of all ages. This is a great time to bring new friends to the RE Program. The workshops will all be held at the Olympia Brown House, 16 Ford Avenue. All will begin right at 10:30 with the exception of Sunday, January 10, when we will start the day in the Sanctuary at Chapin Memorial for a brief "Time for All Ages" before beginning workshops at the Olympia Brown House.

Here is the schedule for January:

- **January 10: The Light of Truth:** (Start out at Chapin Memorial for "Time for All Ages.") What is the light of truth? Suzanne Miller will join us to make our own little chalices to eventually take home and to explore how we can make our own light shine in the lives around us.

- **January 31: Intergenerational Service at Chapin Memorial, “Our Flaming Chalice: What Truth, Community, and Commitment Mean to Us,”** presented by the UUSO Religious Education Program. We plan to bring all of the chalices we’ve made as well as examples of our ideas, sayings for chalice lighting and extinguishing, and some of the highlights of our January sessions.

**Your Homework Challenge:** The children and youth will have many opportunities to create chalices over the coming weeks. We hope to bring them all to the January 31 Intergenerational Service for an amazing display. You are invited to create a chalice to join this display.

There are many ways to make a chalice. You will need two parts to glue together and a candle to put inside. You will need a cup or curved piece to hold the candle at the top and a stand upon which to glue the top part (see illustration).

There are many items that can be used for these parts or you can create the entire shape from one material such as clay.

Some beautiful chalices have been made by finding just the right two things to glue together when wandering the aisles at a second-hand store. You may have two perfect things already somewhere in your home. Of course there are many other materials that can be used: glass, tiles and grout, flowerpots, carved wood, found wood, stones... Once assembled, the chalice is then decorated any way you like or left as is.

A candle is added. We use battery operated candles in the younger children’s classes at UUSO for safety reasons. You may also prefer this option if you happen to use flammable materials for your chalice creation. There are rechargeable non-fire candles for sale online. You can also use any candle you find or make one yourself.

We look forward to celebrating all of our chalices, as well as the purpose and meaning of our Unitarian Universalist Chalice, together on January 31!

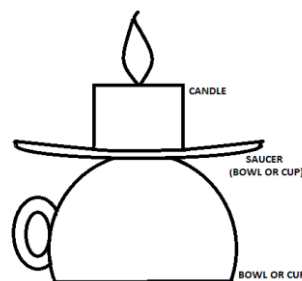

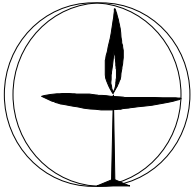
