

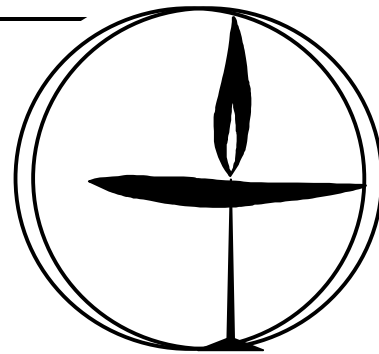

MINISTER'S MUSINGS

Words of Gratitude for Our Shared Ministry

Last week, I was asked by the UU Trauma Response Ministry to deploy to Moscow, Idaho, to lend aid and support to the UU Church of the Palouse. The Moscow community and the UU congregation in particular were in a state of shock and grief after a shooting spree where one of the victims and the perpetrator were members of the congregation. I was informed of the situation and the possible deployment Saturday evening and was officially asked to go Sunday evening. On Tuesday, I was flying out to Moscow. I spent 2.5 days out there working with their minister, meeting with individuals, and conducting community sharing sessions. I flew back Friday and arrived home Saturday.

It is an honor and a privilege to be able to serve our wider UU community in this way. It is an amazing match of my two callings in life. And I could not do it without the love, care, understanding, and support of this congregation. The Board leadership has always been supportive of my work with UUTRM. More than supportive, they have always gone the extra step of reminding me to care of myself as I do this work. The UUSO staff always covers for me when I am called away and is always available if I have a question or need some assistance. And the many volunteers of this congregation continue to do their thing, ensuring that our programs and services continue uninterrupted.

Over and over, while I was in Moscow, the people there expressed their amazement that someone would fly all the way across the country to be there with them at this tragic, trying time. Then they would express a deep gratitude—not only to me, but for my congregation back in Oneonta. They knew the truth of it without my having to say it. The work I do with UUTRM is a shared ministry. It is our ministry to one another. When I am doing this work, I never forget that I have all of you behind me. Your love sustains me—and I, in turn, share it with those I'm called to be with.

I believe I was helpful to the folks of the UU Church of the Palouse. I know I was a welcome support to their minister. After walking with them and listening to them and watching them care for one another, I believe they will weather this tragedy with their community, hope, and faith intact. As I said, it was an honor and a privilege to be there with them and for them. I bring their words of thanks back to you with me. I also, personally, thank you all for allowing me to do this ministry on your behalf.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

Sunday, January 18, was the last of the three Religious Education workshops of our January Intersession about our place in the cosmos. For the first session we paced out the relative distances between planets in our solar system. The second session we walked a chart of the time line of our cosmos. The chart began at the back of the downstairs hall and continued on the floor all the way to the front cupboards of the hall. We saw where on this chart our universe was created and how far it was until all the things we know about on our earth came into being. These happened in the very last inch of this very long chart! The most recent and third session focused on how all people from all cultures have wondered about the stars we can see from our earth.

Knowing that people have always looked to the stars is a powerful connection between us and all other human beings across time. We learned that ancient peoples built observatories and how their yearning to know about the stars lead to the invention of calendars, mathematics, and the study of astronomy. We learned about archaeo-astronomy. People throughout time, from all cultures, have created stories that explain the constellations they observed. We looked at two stories about the constellation we know as Orion.

We will be sharing these two stories with the congregation during this Sunday's worship service on January 25. We hope to continue conversations about our place in the cosmos with you during a potluck lunch following the service. Please stay for the potluck—even if you forget to bring a dish to pass!

I would like to thank the adults who shared their expertise and their time with the children and youth during these January sessions. I would especially like to thank the RE Committee for planning and implementing these lessons, providing snack, and working with the groups. Our workshop leaders were Physics Professor Kevin Schultz, Astrophysicist Michael Frye-Hunt, Dorothy Frye-Hunt, and Anthropology Professor Sallie Han. Theatre Professor John Bagby provided videos and video equipment. We are grateful to Michael Frye-Hunt and Tim Horne for organizing the music for our worship service and for Rev. Craig Schwalenberg for coordinating the adult worship services in January with our January Intersession themes.

There will be two practice sessions for participants in the January Intersession Service, *Our Place in the Cosmos*. There will be a Pizza Party & Practice on Saturday, January 24, from 5:30 to 7 pm and a practice session at 9:30 am right before the service on Sunday, January 25. There will be parts for all!

Baked Cheddar Crackers (Adapted from <https://wintermonroe.wordpress.com>)

Ingredients:

1 1/3 c. flour	8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese
1 tsp. salt	2 egg yolks
6 T unsalted butter (diced)	1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce (or Dijon mustard)
	1 1/2 T water

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 325°.
2. Line 2 cookie sheets with parchment paper.
3. Using a blender or food processor, blend flour and butter, then add cheddar cheese.
4. Put in a bowl. Add egg yolks, water, and Worcestershire sauce.
5. Mix with a spoon and knead a little with hands until it is a smooth dough. Add a little water if necessary so dough can be rolled out but is not sticky.
6. Roll out between two layers of wax paper to 3/8".
7. Peel off top layer of wax paper and cut with cookie cutters.
8. Bake for 15-20 minutes. Cool on racks.
9. Store in an airtight container. Makes about 60 small crackers.

YELLOW FORMS — WHO? WHERE? WHAT? WHY?

Who needs them? Anyone who has purchased something for UUSO.

Where? Look for a plastic paper holder on the wall above the desk in the coat room/hallway to the kitchen/waiting room for the restrooms in Chapin Memorial. In you will find YELLOW forms.

What? YELLOW forms need to be filled out for bills to be paid, reimbursements made, or in kind contributions recorded. Members often purchase items for a committee or UUSO. The office needs the information requested on the YELLOW form before a bill can be paid, the cost of a purchase reimbursed, or an in kind donation recorded.

Why? Use of the YELLOW form facilitates proper recording and payment of bills and reimbursements. The Finance Committee needs to know what it really costs UUSO each year so we can plan for the future. Paying for needed supplies, books or equipment is not the responsibility of committee chairs or members. If someone makes a purchase but prefers to donate the cost, we still need to know about it. If you do not want reimbursement, please fill out the YELLOW form, draw a line across the form to indicate that reimbursement is not requested and deliver the YELLOW form to Olympia Brown House by hand or by mail. —Kay Stulgross, Finance Committee

He and his brother and teen sister, who are football fans, got hoodies and a real football to play the game. 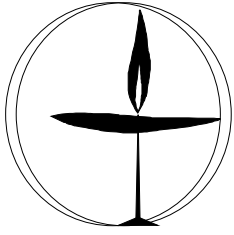
