

General Assembly

It is almost time for our Unitarian Universalist Association's General Assembly. G.A. is our annual gathering at which we do the business of our association, worship together, teach and learn from one another in workshops and seminars, and connect with UUs from across the country (and around the world!). General Assembly is in Portland, OR, this year from June 24-June 28. Sadly, but understandably, due to the distance, I believe I will be the only person from UUSO in attendance at G.A. this year. I'll do my best to represent us and will cast my votes as your delegate as my conscious guides me. If you can't attend General Assembly, you can still get a feel for most of it. Many of the events are live-streamed on the UUA website or recorded for later watching. Highlights this year include:

The Coming of Age Spiritual Trek class (aka COAST) completed their Pilgrimage to Boston last week. Three adults and four teens/young women journeyed together with open hearts and minds to a place of much history and significance to Unitarian Universalists. This was only a part of the journey that began with the first COAST class last fall and that has continued throughout this year. They have worked together with adult advisors and mentors from our congregation to tease out what it is to be a youth, to become an adult, to find meaning and personal understanding of faith/spirit, to find support and connection with our UUSO and larger Unitarian Universalist community, and to celebrate who they are as individuals along the way. The journey is not over and certainly never ends!

Part of our time in Boston included working on individual statements of faith that they presented to our congregation at the “Rites of Passage” Service on Sunday, June 7. This work brought together things they learned on their faith journeys this year. Crafting a faith statement requires a lot of courage. It requires even more courage to present it to the congregation. It is a gift they offered to us.

I would like to challenge you to prepare a faith statement for yourself! Think about what you would say if you were presenting it to the congregation. Approach it as a snapshot in time – what you find yourself believing right now. In COAST, we start with the premise that our beliefs are always changing as we grow and we remain open to new understandings. What follows are some of the questions COASTers considered as they wrote their faith statements. These were meant as thought-starters and they were encouraged to find other questions to consider if these weren’t particularly helpful.

Do you have a sense of “God” or higher power? If so, how would you describe it? Why are we/you here in this world? What are your thoughts about what happens when we die? Do you believe in the concept of “evil”? Is there a force for “good”? Why are there bad things in the world and how do you react/cope with those things? When do you feel the most spiritual, joyful, present, and/or alive?

How would you have answered these questions when you were 12-16 years old? What would it have meant for you to present your work to a congregation? (Perhaps some of you actually did that – what did it mean for you at that time in your life?)

If you craft a faith statement, you will share some of what our teens experienced in COAST and perhaps also learn more about your own faith journey.

Our time in Boston was FUN! We toured the brand new UUA Headquarters which I found much more accessible to guests than the (beautiful, historic, centrally located) Beacon Hill offices. The new building was beautiful in a modern and open floor-plan way. Sunlight streamed in. There were interactive displays and friendly tour guides. The building has Platinum Certification by Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, the highest designation of green building certification. It incorporates historic items brought from the Beacon Hill site with modern, sustainable and earth-responsible architecture. We felt proud to honor our UU heritage as we saw memorials and portraits of famous historical UU leaders. We all learned things that amazed us. For just one example of many, I didn't know that Beacon Press, which is also housed in the new UUA building, published the Pentagon Papers in 1971. We all came away with a sense of pride at the huge scope of the work of Unitarian Universalists worldwide, both present and past. One of the teens asked how she could go about working for the UUA someday.

We had meaningful adventures all over Boston. We walked parts of the Freedom Trail and saw important places in US history. We played tag on the Boston Common every time we walked across it. There was a lot of walking! The group visited the attractions that they chose when they first began to raise money for the trip: the Museum of Science, the New England Aquarium, Fire and Ice Restaurant, and the museums in Salem that commemorate the dark time of the Salem Witch Trials. Our accommodations were an Airbnb in a nearby suburb that we found to be spacious and comfortable, and it met all our needs.

On Sunday morning we attended services at the historic Arlington Street (UU) Church. We were welcomed into a beautiful sanctuary to a service about facing fears by Rev. Kim K. Drawford Harvie. She preached from William Ellery Channing's impressive pulpit which was much higher than ours at UUSO! After the service, one of the COASTers was overheard saying, "I love it here!" We enjoyed a delicious lunch and fellowship time following the service. We incorporated a bit of our Arlington Street Church experience with you during the UUSO "Rites of Passage" Service on Sunday, June 7

There were the inevitable traffic delays, last minute closings of venues, parking woes, a missed train, and a bit more walking than had been expected. These things happen on any trip and also are good life lessons in dealing with the unexpected. Our COASTers handled everything with cheerfulness and flexibility. We laughed a lot together. On the ride back home to Oneonta one of the COASTers said, "I feel the happiest I've ever felt in my life."

Something new to this year's trek was being able to provide up-to-the-minute photos and comments about our adventures via social media. 
