Special Second Collection, Sunday, October 19

On Sunday, October 19, Rev. Mark Kiyimba, a Ugandan UU minister, will be in our pulpit speaking about "The Importance of Our UU Faith in Uganda." His congregation supports a number of worthwhile projects in his country. Among these are:

- Their New Life School, which is an orphanage school of children who have lost their parents due to HIV/AIDS, catering to 650 children. These are children who are orphans but are not sick with the virus.
- The Church also operates an orphanage home for 33 children who have lost their parents to AIDS and who are also themselves infected with the virus.
- The Church, in addition, operates a Standing on the Side of Love Project, an LGBT outreach in Kampala, which shelters over 32 young gay men and lesbian adults.

Our Board of Trustees has approved a second collection on October 19 to help Rev. Mark's congregation continue these projects. Should you wish to contribute, please make your checks payable to UUSO and write Uganda in the memo line.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

The Explorers Class (Kindergarten through 3rd Grade) is working with a curriculum that looks closely at our Seventh Principle: *Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.* They have been visiting a "Special Place" in the backyard of the Olympia Brown House each Sunday and watching for changes as the season progresses. They noticed that there are now fewer bugs, it smells crisper and colder, and there are more leaves on the ground. Their rain guage showed that it had rained 1¼ inches since their class the previous week. Some of the ferns have turned brown and are falling over.

The class has been observing the life cycle of Monarch butterflies. It has always been tricky to find Monarch caterpillars in "the wild" to fit with the RE schedule. This year I ordered Monarch eggs that were mailed to me this fall. You may have seen the caterpillars and/or chrysalids that were at church the last two weeks. Adults were as interested in them as the RE children!

It is truly wonderful to watch the metamorphosis of a Monarch butterfly. Their chrysalids have beautiful spots that look like real gold! It is mindboggling to imagine changing into a chrysalis, the journey to Mexico, and the journey back north. There are three to four generations of Monarchs that make their way back to us in the spring and summer. The last generation in the fall is physiologically different from the previous ones. It is the generation that has to make it from here all the way to Mexico. Once there, they settle on branches of oyamel fir trees where they go into a state that is similar to hybernation. This fall generation isn't able to reproduce until they have overwintered in Mexico and the warm, longer days of spring signal to them that it is time to become active again. Then it's back north to us, although it takes a few generations to get here.

Last winter was the lowest count of overwintering Monarchs on record. This summer I saw only two Monarchs in my garden and I strongly suspect I saw the same one twice. Monarch butterfly habitat has been shrinking as more and more roadsides are mowed. Herbicide use has decreased the milkweed that they need for survival. Those of us who have gone out of our way to plant insect-friendly gardens may have actually exposed them to pesticides. According to a report released last June by the Pesticide Research Institute and Friends of the Earth, a majority of the the bee and butterfly attracting plants sold by Walmart, Lowes, and Home Depot contained high levels of systemic pesticides!

Yet we can make a difference for Monarchs. Many people are planting butterfly gardens. It is important to let garden centers know that you won't buy plants if they are full of pesticides. We have a plant sale at church each spring where you can find flowers for your garden that butterflies and bees use for nectar. There are many online places to purchase organic plants and seeds.

Monarch Watch, www.MonarchWatch.com, has a program to create Monarch Waystations (habitats) in the yards of homes, schools, businesses, and any other type of garden or unused plot of land. You can order a seed kit for \$16 that includes three kinds of milkweed and six types of plants that butterflies and bees use for nectar. If your site meets certain requirements, you can register it as a Certified Monarch Waystation, complete with a sign to let your neighbors know what you are doing!

Once you have established milkweed plants, you can order Monarch eggs and caterpillars from many online sites. Sadly, this may be the only way to observe them for now.

We really can make a difference. The Florida Atala Butterfly was thought to be almost extinct in the 1960's. Gardeners planted host plants and the Atala made a comeback. By the 1980's Atala populations returned to range across the state.

Let's celebrate the interconnected web of all life. We can change the world – one garden at a time.
