



SPECIAL SECOND COLLECTION, SUNDAY, OCTOBER 26

On Sunday, October 19, Rev. Mark Kiyimba, a Ugandan UU minister, was in our pulpit speaking about "The Importance of Our UU Faith in Uganda." His congregation supports a number of worthwhile projects in his country. Among these are:

- Their New Life School, which is an orphanage school of children who have lost their parents due to HIV/AIDS, catering to 650 children. These are children who are orphans but are not sick with the virus.
- The Church also operates an orphanage home for 33 children who have lost their parents to AIDS and who are also themselves infected with the virus.
- The Church, in addition, operates a Standing on the Side of Love Project, an LGBT outreach in Kampala, which shelters over 32 young gay men and lesbian adults.

While we had a second collection to support this work on October 19, **we will be having an additional second collection this coming Sunday, October 26**, to help Rev. Mark's congregation continue these projects. Should you wish to contribute, please make your checks payable to UUSO and write Uganda in the memo line. ***Donations must be received within a day or two after the October 26 service to be included in the wiring of funds to Uganda.***

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

This past Sunday the Hogwarts-Oneonta class participated in making potions. They looked at how common household cleaning potions often contain chemicals that are harmful to living creatures and to the environment. The potions they concocted in class will serve to clean houses as well as not to harm living creatures or the environment. They learned to make the following potions that they would like to share with you:

ALL-PURPOSE SPRAY CLEANER

Ingredients:

- 1/4-1/2 teaspoon liquid detergent
- 3 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 cups water

Method:

Combine ingredients in a spray bottle and shake until the washing soda has dissolved. Apply and wipe off with a sponge or rag.

FURNITURE POLISH

Ingredients:

- 1/2 teaspoon olive oil
- 1/4 cup vinegar or fresh lemon juice

Method:

Mix the ingredients in a glass jar. Dab a soft rag into the solution and wipe onto wood surfaces. Cover the glass jar and store indefinitely.

GREASE CUTTER SPRAY

Ingredients:

- 2 cups warm water
- 1/4 cup Castille Soap (we used Dr. Brommers)
- 10 drops essential oil

Method:

Mix together in a spray bottle and spray on surface, let sit for a few seconds, then wipe off with a damp sponge.

Be sure to label your potions so they are used correctly. The class potions manual has many other green cleaning recipes. I would be happy to give you a copy.

“DAY OF THE DEAD” CANDLELIGHT DINNERS

We are extending the sign up for this event! A Membership Committee representative will be circulating with a clipboard on Sunday, October 26, at church.

Dia de los Muertos (“Day of the Dead”) is a Mexican holiday that celebrates the memory of deceased loved ones by gathering family and friends to pray for, remember, and share stories of those who have passed away. It is celebrated annually from October 31-November 2. The Membership Committee is organizing Day of the Dead Candlelight Dinners to be held on Saturday, November 1, from 6 to 9 pm. Please join us in an opportunity to spend a cozy evening sharing a meal (Day of the Dead dinners are typically Mexican-themed) as well as stories of loved ones at the home of a fellow congregant.

Sign up to be a guest or to host a dinner. All are invited to bring a picture of the loved one they wish to celebrate as well as a small but significant memento that represents that person or his/her memory. Guests will contribute a dish for the meal. Hosts provide beverages and a welcoming table for 8 to 10. Additionally hosts will set up an altar where ofrendas (offerings) are laid out for the dead. Pictures and mementos can be displayed on the altar for the evening. 
