

- ❖ Joanne Sharkey—jams, honey, mustards, syrup.


Many of these arts and crafts will be included in the raffle, so be sure to stop at the raffle table and get your tickets.

ADPOT-A-FAMILY GIFT GIVING!

The Adopt-A Family gift tag Christmas Tree will arrive at UUSO on Sunday, November 30. We are hoping you will all get involved by taking a gift tag and providing a part of the holiday celebration for our three adopted community families who will not have any gifts without some help. This is how it works:

Check out the Christmas tree in the back of the sanctuary; take a gift tag to provide a gift for a child or a gift card for the family based on their needs, such as food cards, gas cards, or utilities. Tags will describe the ages, sizes of the children, their favorite wish, favorite colors, or a particular request. Buy the gift and return it with the tag securely taped or attached. Place it under the tree.

Tags will appear on the Holiday tree on Sunday, November 30, and December 7. Gifts must be returned by December 14, or arrange with the committee to be delivered before December 18. Members of Social Action Committee will deliver the gifts to Family Service Association on December 18. FSA will then deliver gifts to each of our three families. We will also provide wrapping paper, tape, and ribbon for the gifts to be wrapped by the parents.

Adopt-A-Family is a special program of Family Service Association. FSA is located at 277 Chestnut Street in Oneonta and is a private, non-profit helping agency. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

In the last newsletter, I wrote about the many activities that the COAST (Coming of Age Spiritual Trek) group will be doing in the coming months. (Be sure to see announcements in this newsletter about fundraising activities!) This article will be a peek at what's coming up for the Web-of-Life Explorers class as well as for the Hogwarts-Oneonta class.

The Web-of-Life Explorers are children who are in kindergarten through third grade. They meet in the double classroom downstairs at Chapin Memorial. They have a "Special Spot" in the backyard of the Olympia Brown House at 16 Ford Avenue. They go outside almost every Sunday, even through the winter! As the class observes their Special Spot each Sunday, they are able to spot subtle differences as the seasons change and to appreciate all the living things that they encounter. They record observations in individual journals and conduct experiments. Right now they are observing growing beans in their classroom and also the weekly changes in an indoor compost tank.

The Explorers will join all Religious Education participants for January workshops that explore our place in the cosmos. We expect to have lessons about our solar system, ethno-astronomy, and about the music of the spheres. We plan to have a field trip after class on Sunday, January 18, to the SUCO planetarium. RE participants, the RE Committee, adult volunteers, and I will create an Intergenerational Service for Sunday, January 25, to share some of our experiences with the congregation.

Regular RE programs begin again in February. The Explorers are blessed this year to have Adina Johnson as one of their teachers. (Of course <u>all</u> RE teachers are blessings!) Adina and her family spend much time on a nearby farm. She has graciously offered to bring animals to visit the class and she has many wonderful stories about their care. Winter classes will include experiences with: rain and snow, litters and runts, pets, things that hatch from eggs, uniqueness, friendship, and crickets.

The Hogwarts-Oneonta class consists of fourth through sixth graders. They have been experiencing our Seven UU Principles through the lens of the wizarding world of Harry Potter. When their classes begin again in February, they can expect classes about magical plants, curses, good vs. evil, magical house pets, amulets and charms, and the secret language of flowers. These classes will look at the interdependent web of life, personal power to affect change, social justice work, acceptance of difference, and explorations of faith. The winter session will conclude with a Wizarding Challenge class. There will be cooperative challenge tasks that will lead up to participants earning completion certificates. This will be a chance to have fun while celebrating their class community. It will also be a chance to gain exemption from the dreaded N.E.W.T.'s (Nastily Exhausting Wizarding Tests) allowing them to progress to spring classes. (Don't worry, I really have no plans to have them sit for N.E.W.T.'s—even if they are unable to come to the challenge class!)

Here's to the Winter RE program!

ENDOWMENT FUND GRANTS FOR 2014-2015!!

The Endowment Committee is pleased to have received many thoughtful grant applications again this year and to be able now to announce the seven projects which were awarded funds:

- NAACP Oneonta Area Branch: Funds in support of their annual community picnic!
- Pets, Plants, People and the Plant: Funds to provide and distribute free backyard compost bins made from recycled wooden pallets and to an emergency pet food pantry!
- **Stop the Pipeline:** Funds to cover some of the costs of providing community informational materials!
- UUSO Design Committee: Funds for an additional folding table for Chapin!
- Catholic Charities: Funds to provide supplemental activities/materials for children during the summer lunch program in Neahwa Park!
- **UUSO Properties Committee:** Funds to complete the installation of an interior door between the OBH living room and the stairway hall to increase privacy for those using the living room!
- Oneonta Acupuncture Clinic: These funds will be used to help establish a local cooperative reduced-fee acupuncture clinic!!

We received requests totaling \$5,910 and were able to distribute \$3,430 in grants. The Endowment Committee can distribute money only from the income it receives on its investments. We are so grateful to all who contribute to the Endowment Fund through individual gifts and through the returnable bottle/can efforts! 
