MINISTER'S MUSINGS

Hear ye? Hear ye?

Over the last month or so, we have experienced a few issues with our sound system in the sanctuary. One of our pulpit microphones has ceased functioning, so we are down to one sound channel for the service. We have we'll have as special collaborative service with the also experienced an issue at several services where the sound loop, the wire that encircles the sanctuary and broadcasts the service directly to specially enabled hearing devices, has been broadcasting at a lower volume or not at all. Scott Segar, our Audio Tech Coordinator, and several of our Audio Techs, are working to track down these audio bugs and fix them. We are looking at options for replacing the pulpit microphones. In the meantime, we ask for you patience and your understanding. If you are having an issue with the sound system on Sunday morning, please let an Usher know. They will alert the volunteer working the sound system who will to to adjust the controls to fix the problem. Remember, if you are having a problem with the sound system, you are probably not the only one. So, letting the usher know will help everyone. Please do try not to disrupt the service, though. Together, we will work to find a solution so our worship services are available and welcoming to all.

Spring Worship Services

The Spring Worship Calendar is included with this newsletter (in it's printed form) and will be available online soon. Here are some of the highlights planned in the Spring quarter:

- Annual Geek Sermon will be on April 15th and will focus on the joy of cooking, baking, communing, and conviving. I plan to make some food to share with everyone.
- At the Religious Education service on April 29th, we'll thank our R.E. volunteers and honor our graduation seniors. The semi-annual COAST (Coming Of Age Spiritual Trek) service on May 20th will give our youth

a chance to share their discoveries about their own faith and beliefs with our congregation.

- Before the Congregational Meeting on May 6th, music of Yolanda Bush and Michael & Dorothy Frye-Hunt exploring the place where ideas intersect and souls meet. Another collaborative service will take place on June 10th, when the Rev. Kimberly Debus will be having a faithful conversation with me about our personal beliefs and musical friend of UUSO, Kiya Heartwood, will be providing music for service. (The Board has recommended contracting with Rev. Kimberly to provide some ministerial support and coverage during my sabbatical later this year. The congregation will be voting on this proposal as part of the budget at the congregational meeting in May.)
- Pulpit guests will include our own Ginny Scheer on April 22nd and community leader Nettie Jean Scarzafava on May 27th.
- The annual favorite, the UUSO Poetry service, will take place on June 24th with Pam Strother coordinating and leading the weaving of words.
- We'll explore UU History on Mother's Day and Father's Day, looking at some of our faith's founding mothers and fathers. And we'll make time on Mother's Day, May 13th, for a child dedication. (IF you would like to have your child dedicated or have questions about this traditional ritual, please contact me before May 1st.)

It's going to be a great quarter for worship-- even better when you are there!

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

It isn't, at first glance, apparent that spring is coming. There is much snow on the ground. We expect to have our annual Easter Party and Can Hunt on April first. We'll start out for Time for All Ages in the sanctuary while cans are being hidden by Youth. It is quite possible we will need to hide them inside if the outside still has standing snow. This has happened before and doesn't dampen (or freeze) our spirits.

I do, however, see buds on the lilacs, silly daffodils starting to pop up, and some wonderful sunshine. I think of the sunny days ahead as I am putting together the schedule for the rest of the RE year.

We will have two intergenerational services in the coming quarter. We will celebrate our teachers, volunteers, as well as our youth who will be graduating from high school on April 29th. May 20th will be the "I Believe" service where we honor those who have completed their Coming-of-Age Program, COAST. Classes for Explorers (children in K-3rd grade who are learning about the interdependence of all life) will have lessons called: *Birds, Grains, Clean Water, Our Bodies as Miracles, and a Day to Remember Our Year Together*. Seekers (those in 4th and 5th grade who have the <u>Popcorn Theology</u> curriculum) will watch clips from the movies: Brave, Wall-E, Frozen, Up, and Jungle Book. Classes will be about Responsibility, The Seventh UU Principle, Imperfection, Adventure, and Being All You Can Be. COAST (6-8th grade) will be meeting informally with mentors, exploring other faiths, finishing their service projects, and writing faith statements to be read at their May 20th service. They will have a "Circle of Life" retreat April 6-8th. They will undertake their pilgrimage to Boston May 4-6th. YRUU (grades 9-12) will continue to set their own schedule of class meetings and attending services together. We will have an All-Youth Canoe Trip on June 10 and finish the RE year with an All-RE Ice cream party on June 17.

YRUU member, Caroline Bagby, has received the Oneonta Common Council Trailblazer Award. She joins two other women who will receive their awards during a reception at City Hall, in downtown Oneonta, at 6:15 p.m. March 20th. According to the Oneonta Daily Star, "A trailblazer is defined as someone who has opened the pathways for others to follow . . . and as someone who could be described as a pioneer, a forerunner or a mover and shaker." We are so proud and happy for her!

People, Not Pipelines thanks the UUSO Endowment Committee for the generous \$150 grant it awarded us in December 2017.

Our small all-volunteer group applied for the grant to help fund a postcard project addressing New York's increasing use of climate-destabilizing fracked gas. The cards call on Governor Cuomo to 1) halt NY's gasinfrastructure build-out and 2) initiate a swift transition to renewable energy.

We've printed 2,500 postcards so far, featuring three different messages; about half have already been signed and mailed. Thanks to the UUSO members who signed cards at the March 18 service. And, of course, thank you all for welcoming us into the UUSO.


