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MINISTER'S MUSINGS

The Courage to Covenant

On August 5th, our service focused on spiritual practice and the benefits to our health and spiritual wellbeing. The following day, one of you asked me "what creates a spiritually healthy congregation?" It was a great question, and my answer included a focus on commitments of time, talent, and treasure; seeing the spiritual call of our seemingly mundane committee and leadership work; and perhaps most importantly, members supporting each other with help, encouragement, openness, and kindness.

I was then shown the twelve word summary of the congregational covenant you all have been working on: "get involved, stay engaged, be respectful and openminded, grow and learn together."

As we continue this sabbatical time together, I believe it's more important than ever to lean into this – to practice this covenant even before it is – hopefully – adopted at your congregational meeting on October 28th. Because even though there may be some work yet to do on it, that doesn't mean you get to ignore it – now is when you have to begin practicing it.

Now let's be clear: this covenant is not about authority or demands. Covenant should not be a set of hard and fast rules that carry a punishment. Rather, it is a commitment about how we treat one another and how we forgive one another. It's the often forgotten line in the familiar Rumi poem, "come, come, whoever you are, wanderer, worshipper, lover of leaving: Though you've broken your vows a thousand times, come yet again, come."

It's not about taking our toys – or our pledges – and going home. It's not about ghosting or disappearing or cutting folks off when we've messed up. Though we've broken our vows a thousand times, covenant

asks us to come back to the table.

That takes courage.

It takes courage to create covenant; and it has to be driven by everyone. It can't be dictated by the people in power, whether that's positional power like boards and religious professionals, or systemic power like the white people or the top donors. We have to be courageous enough to include all voices of those who have agreed to freely come together in the process of creating and living it out.

It takes courage to follow a covenant that actually treats everyone like a person, with inherent worth and dignity. And know that callousness chips away at dignity.

It takes courage to see covenant not as "yes or no" but as "yes-and." In a world where you must choose between false binaries like this or that, yes or no, good or evil, friend or enemy, black or white, covenant suggests that there are multiple choices that may all be true. Covenant asks us to look for possibility, to say yes, and... this too.

It takes courage to covenant, especially when covenant is broken. Covenant audaciously says "come back anyway, trust anyway, make room anyway."

Friends, we have to get this right if we're going to covenant at all. We have to pay close attention to how we create and live out covenants in our congregations. We have to have the courage to get it right in our congregations, or we have no chance of getting it right in the world.

How do we do it?

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SAWDUST FROM THE BOARD

The Board met on August 15 at 6:30pm in the Sanctuary. After a chalice lighting, opening words selected by Rev. Kimberley, and a check in with those present, we reviewed and approved the July 28 minutes.

Launch of the Campaign of Kindness: Rev. Kimberley reviewed her 12 recommended tenets of the new UUSO Campaign of Kindness. The Board of Trustees committed to following these to the best of our ability. To quote Rev. Kimberley: “if we take up kindness as this congregation’s spiritual practice, we may see a difference in how information is shared, how decisions are made, how people make space for one another, how people treat one another.” Based on recent unintentional missteps resulting in hurt feelings and a longtime member leaving UUSO, the Trustees are especially focused on tenet #9: Include the right people. When setting up meetings or sending emails, ask “Who isn’t in the room or on the email that may be affected”? Karen also reviewed with the Board her 10 questions to ask when considering a change such as “Who has been included in discussing the change?” and “Who will be impacted by the change?” The Board noted that our work on the Congregational Covenant of Right Relations fits well into this exploration, particularly the current draft summary phrases of:

- Get involved, and stay engaged
- Be Honest and Kind
- Be Respectful and Open Minded
- Grow and Learn Together

Treasurer’s report: We voted to add Karen Palmer, Arlana Young, Jeane Bennett-O’Dea, Margaret Davis and Sue Gates as signatories for the UUSO Community Bank Account with Sue as “read only”. We also voted to add the Endowment Committee Chair and Financial Secretary to the Walden Equity Account with Schwab. The Board reviewed the Profit and Loss Statement for July to be adjusted upon closing the 2017-18 year out.

Other Business: We reviewed proposed bylaws changes to be presented at the Congregational Meeting in October. We also discussed Sounding Board questions and comments which were all referred to other committees or to the bylaws.

Next BOT Meeting and Sounding Board: The Board will meet next on Wednesday, September 19 at 6:30pm in the Sanctuary. All UUSO members and friends are welcome to observe. We also encourage comments, questions, and concerns to be expressed during the “Sounding Board” held on Sunday, September 16.

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Kindness is the key. During my time as your sabbatical minister, we'll be focusing on kindness and covenant – this week, I asked the board of trustees, the sabbatical team, and the staff to take seriously the process of being more kind and more inclusive of others when taking actions, having conversations, and making change. You'll be hearing more about our campaign of kindness from them and me in the coming days and weeks, but know that these remarks are the start.

It matters that we are kind to one another. It matters that we are transparent about our actions that might affect another. It matter that we ask who is not in the room, who the stakeholders are, whether it's necessary or useful, or whether a change needs to happen immediately or over time in order to be kind to all.

And – it's about being kind to yourself, too – taking responsibility for your own reactions, asking yourself if it's worth being upset about, or quitting over. Remembering that covenant makes space for mistakes and reconciliation.

We don't have to be perfect. That's the grace of our Universalist faith. But we do need to try to get it right, because the call of our faith is deeply embedded in loving the family of humanity. And that's not just some huge 7-billion person concept. That's you. And you. And the person next to you. And the one who hurt your feelings. And the one you made a cutting remark to. And the one you would rather not be on a committee with. And the one who makes you smile when they're near. And the one you had a hard time with once but forgave and now enjoy. And the one who has learned to trust you again. And the one who is still learning.

You come to the Unitarian Universalist Society of Oneonta for many reasons – spiritual growth and deepening, to put your faith into action as you answer the call of love, to do your part to draw the circle of love ever wider. Remember – the people in this congregation also belong in the circle of love.

It's time to stop whisper campaigns and backroom meetings and subtle – or not subtle threats. It's time to be up front with each other. It's time to consider the human element in this very human organization. It's time to be covenantal. It's time to be a beacon of hope and love – to attract people who want to be here because of how good you are to each other. On December 9th, don't hand Rev. Craig a broken cup – hand him a chalice full of loving kindness.

PLANS UNDERWAY FOR THE NEW CHAPIN MEMORIAL CARPET

By now, many people have seen the sample of the new carpet chosen with congregational input by the Aesthetics Committee to be installed in the sanctuary, foyer, and coat room this Fall. The Properties Committee has been busy securing contractors and carpet installers to begin the work with a projected start date of September 10. At this time we will need 6-10 sturdy volunteers to place all Sanctuary chairs on to the stage so the old carpet removal, floor repair, and electrical work can begin. Please contact Karen Palmer if you are interested in helping out. It is likely that the following Sunday service will either be held on the wooden floor or in an alternate location. If all goes well, the carpet will be installed the following week and we'll be holding the next worship service on a brand new carpet. Again, a team of volunteer chair movers will be needed. Naturally unexpected surprises may occur as the old carpet is removed and the floor repair begins so flexibility and patience will be required throughout this project. We are indebted to Tom O'Brien for making the initial arrangements with Colortile of Oneonta and various contractors and to Duncan Smith, chair of Properties for coordinating the project.

Other projects from last year and continuing this year include supporting the NAACP film series, Backpack Buddies, UUSC Guest at your Table, Family Services support, Social Action Table after Worship Services (literature, petitioning, letter writing), Food for Thought events, and Change for Change coordination. The Social Action Team has also sponsored events to support Syrian Refugees and other causes. Their meetings hosted by Alice Siegfried at her home include the spiritual components of lighting a chalice, reading opening and closing words, and reviewing their covenant. They enjoy a social time together with a potluck following the meeting. The current Chair is Carol Malz and the current members are Chuck Hudson, Dawn Kilts, Rhiannon Ham, Kari Reynolds, Kathy Shimberg, Janet Sutta, Emily Philips, Alice Siegfried, Dotty Hudson, and Arlana Young. Cindy Squires rolls the coins and makes the deposits for Change for Change. The Social Action Team truly brings UUSO's Mission outside of the four walls of its buildings and into the world to make a positive difference.

HELPING SYRIAN REFUGEES

Thanks to the generosity of our UUSO family, the Social Action Team (SAT) was able to send a check for \$1,809 to support The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) work helping Syrian refugees in Croatia. We are grateful to those who attended the Anne Feeny benefit concert in May and others who subsequently made donations.

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee has partnered with The Center for Peace Studies (CPS) in Croatia to support Syrian refugees. The CPS provides immediate humanitarian support for refugees and engages in advocacy for changes in Croatian and European Union asylum policy.

The focal point of the initiative is building a Refugee Support Center in Zagreb to provide an array of direct services to transiting and long-term refugees — including legal aid, humanitarian support, psychosocial support, employment counseling, a Croatian language program, and special empowerment programs focused on women and families, children, and young men.

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
