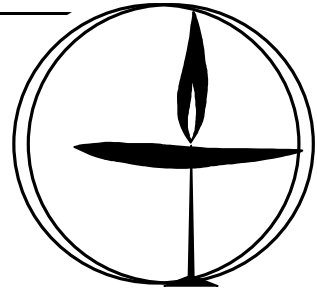

Minister's Musings

“Where do we come from? What are we? Where are we going?”

~ hymn #1003 from *Singing the Journey*

This hymn is a popular one at General Assembly (GA), our annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists. I think it has been a part of one of the worship services or opening/closing ceremonies at every GA since the new hymnal was printed. The hymn taps into both the universal human question of place and purpose and the ongoing concern of Unitarian Universalism as a whole. Being non-creedal and so diverse in our beliefs, it can be challenging for us to define ourselves as a group. Are we a church? A denomination? A club? And as the role of religion changes in society, it is natural for us to contemplate what the future holds for us. Some people sing the song as a plaintive lament, which is not, I believe, what the original author intended. Rather, I believe the hymn is an invitation to focus on the important questions of identity and purpose.



Who are we? What's our mission? How are we going to accomplish our goals?

We are at just such a point in the life of our congregation. Our stewardship numbers are forcing us to address some challenging truths and answer some important questions. How did we get here? What do we want to be? What do we want to do? What's our purpose, our mission? When the congregation called me as their minister back on May 17, 2009, I preached a sermon entitled, "Do You Hear?", where I quoted from another of our hymns, #112 in *Singing the Living Tradition*,

**All the dreams, all the dares, all the sighs, all the prayers--
They are yours, mine, and theirs.
Do you hear? Do you hear?**

You called me as your minister that day. You charged me to be your spiritual leader. With the Board of Trustees, also elected by you, I was tasked with setting a course, casting a vision for who and what this congregation could be. This congregation was looking for a minister that could inspire them, connect them to others seeking to build a

better world, deeply engage in social justice, promote community, lead a team of dedicated and effective staff, and help us all make a difference in the world and in each other's lives. Over the last seven years, we've been making slow but steady progress towards many of those goals. For some, the pace has been too slow. For others, the changes have come too suddenly. Such is always the way of things. Sometimes it is hard to see where we've improved and what we have accomplished. And any change, even the positive ones, can be stressful. In looking back, I'm proud of what we've accomplished together-- and I'm excited about where we are headed.

We are poised to become, once again, a recognizable force for positive change in our community. We have more people visiting our congregation than ever before. Other congregations are seeking to partner with us on social justice, worship, education, and social events. I see us becoming a catalyst for meaningful, transformative conversations about racism and oppression. I see us becoming even stronger advocates for our gay, lesbian, bisexual, queer, and transgender neighbors-- providing a safe place to meet, organize, and educate people on the realities and challenges they face. I see our staff becoming more connected to their professional colleagues around the country and bringing back ideas, music, programs, and practices that will make us better at everything we do here. I see this congregation starting a dynamic campus ministry, reaching out to the students that are seeking, desperately, for a sense of purpose and meaning in an increasingly complicated and isolating world. I see us becoming a Green Sanctuary, an example and an inspiration to everyone in the wider community that we can make a difference, we can protect our precious planet and reduce our harmful effects on the environment. I see us growing, not just in numbers, but in our connections to one another and to others beyond our walls. I see our congregation being more than a sanctuary; I see UUSO being a beacon. Leading the way and inviting all who would join us in the task of building a better world where all beings matter.

This is what you called me to do that amazing day in May, eight years ago. I accepted your call and your challenge. Together, we have done a great deal so far. Together, we are can do so much more. I'm looking forward to the next eight years-- and the world we are going to create together.

Religious Education News

All of us at UUSO are honored and blessed to be in relationship with all of us of every age. We learn so much from each other about ourselves, the world, and about our UU faith. We change the world together.

The month of May is the time to consider if you would like to take the opportunity to be even more present in the spiritual growth of children and youth in our Society. We are looking for teachers for RE classes next fall. Would this work bring you joy? Many RE teachers say they experience spirit and learn more their faith in an RE classroom than in any other way.

Mentors and apprentices are partners in an ancient human dance, and one of teaching's great rewards is the daily chance it gives us to get back on the dance floor. It is the dance of the spiraling generations, in which the old empower the young with their experience and the young empower the old with new life, reweaving the fabric of the human community as they touch and turn.

You don't need to be any sort of expert to be a teacher in RE. You can learn the class lessons as you go along. You are given the curriculum, the materials, and the support and camaraderie of your DRE and your co-teachers. You are even given a snack! You will occasionally have a small amount of reading (30 min. or less) to do the week before a class. The classroom time is shared and flexible so that you are able to have Sunday's off when needed. There are also days off scheduled into the year when there are no RE classes.

RE teachers do need to bring some things to the table. Hopefully these are things that also bring you joy. I agree with the Unitarian Church of Portland in that: "The essential qualities of a good Learning Community teacher are a love of children, a sense of wonder about life, empathy and the ability to listen, and a willingness more to share who you are than what you know. Above all, teachers are mentors and companions of the children as our young ones undertake their religious journeys in life."

I would add that as an RE teacher you will need to be able put yourself aside as you look to the needs of all the individuals in the room. Sometimes you will need the skill of gathering everyone's attention. Other useful skills are being playful, silly, and flexible with the day's agenda. This is to allow for those unexpected moments of wonderfulness that occur all too often while exploring spirit with children. RE children and youth are so wise. They are so thoughtful. They are so active! You will be amazed.

RE teachers provide tools for being actively compassionate, for doing justice and for listening to the spirit inside of us. We learn alongside our children and youth, through our willingness to be open to their questions, their energy, and their optimism. Working with

children changes us too. It is the way we go forward into the future with our UU faith. Mentoring and guiding our UU children and youth is an active way to bring hope and change to our broken world.

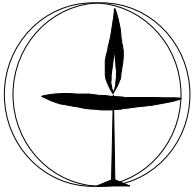
