Welcome Our New Bookkeeper!

UUSO has a new Bookkeeper! We are pleased to welcome Taylor Czyzewski to our UUSO staff team. We received dozens of applicants for the position. The search committee interviewed the 6 most qualified and unanimously recommended Taylor for the position. Taylor works full time at Springbook as their Senior Staff Accountant. She has an advanced degree in accounting and has experience as a bookkeeper with companies and nonprofits of various sizes. Taylor is currently scheduled to work Monday and Thursday evenings along with some Sunday afternoons. Black Lives Matter Banner - UPDATE

I've hosted several listening sessions on the topic of the Black Lives Matter banner. About a dozen or so people have attended and the conversations have been illuminating and engaging. I've also received emails from many who were not able to attend one of the listening sessions. Here is an informal summary of what I have heard so far.

- Many people were unaware of how weathered the sign had become.
- All of the people who have expressed an

opinion want the banner replaced.

- Most of those who want it replaced, want it to be another Black Lives Matter banner.
- Some folks have expressed a desire to have a banner or different banners that highlight other social justice issues we are engaged with.
- A few would like to see the wording on the banner changed to be more universal, or to better express who we are as a congregation.
- Even though the congregation doesn't have an active anti-racism group/activity, members are working on this issue in other ways in the community. Those active in this way appreciate the congregation's support and inspiration.
- The Oneonta chapter of the NAACP appreciates the banner and hopes it is rehung.
- If we are going to change the banner, then the congregation should vote on it.
- If we just replace the BLM banner with a brand new one, no vote is needed-- but, we should make an event of it and acknowledge our recommitment.

There is still time to share your opinion on what we should do once the banner comes down. Contact Rev. Craig via phone or email to share your thoughts.

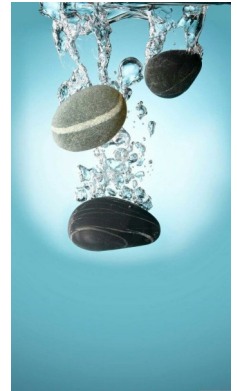

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

This past Sunday, Rev. Craig and I had separately decided to do worship services on the topic of kindness. We crossed paths the morning before our respective services and Rev. Craig had the thought that it might be National Kindness Day. He looked it up and sure enough February 17 was “National Acts of Kindness Day.” How serendipitous! In fact I had real life example of a random act of just the day before when was purchasing oranges for our Children’s Worship at Hanford. A store manager overheard that I was buying snack for our group. He took an orange off of the scale as a gift to our children.

Our Children’s Worship Service was called, *Kindness and Connection*. As is traditional for us, the “Joys and Sorrows” part of our service is called “Stones of Sharing.” Children helped pour water into a basin. Each child picked a stone from a basket. We went around the circle, each having a chance to share with the group something important from their lives as they added their stone to the basin. It was also fine to pass by quietly placing a stone in the water. A stone was put in the water at the end for all of the things we didn’t say but were still important to us. We talked about how the ripples from each stone placed in the water remind us that whatever touches one of us touches us all. This was one example of our connection to each other.



Our art project was another example. We decorated strips of colorful paper with words or drawings of kindness. Amelia W. remembered there was a book in our Mara Kern Library that had drawings and words of children from all over the world showing their ideas of Peace. She found it for us. The book was, [A Million Visions of Peace](#), edited by J. Garrison and Andrew Tubesing, and was a good resource for our activity. Children also asked me to look up translations of words of kindness in other languages for them to include on their strips of paper. Some examples of the words we learned from translate.google.com were: “love” in Swahili is *upendo*; “care” in Irish is *cúram*; “rainbow” in French is *arc en ciel*; and “unicorn” in Spanish is *unicornio*. In additions to words there were drawings of hearts, rainbows, unicorns, and other beautiful designs. We made the strips of paper into circles and connected them together in a very long chain. This was a visual reminder of how we are all connected in caring community. We hope to bring this chain to our RE service in the spring. We plan to ask congregants at our RE service to add their own strips of paper with references to kindness. Once we have connected all of our links it will be a very long chain!

Completed pot-scrubbers will then be available to take home and enjoy using, at no cost. We're looking forward to your participation in this worthwhile recycling project.
