RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The children in our religious education program had a Children's Worship service on March 17. It was our annual service to celebrate our connection with Youchaou's School in Mali.

Our church relationship began in 2005 when children in the RE program wanted children to correspond with in Africa. Zanna McKay told us about Youchaou Traore, who was someone she learned of while she lived in Mali. He was trying to grow a school for children in his neighborhood where children had no other access to education. I began to exchange emails with him. He was (and is) someone who truly makes a difference for the people around him. Members and friends of our church began to meet to plan how to best assist him in his work. We formed what was then the Mali Task Force, now called the UUSO Mali Education Project. The purpose of the group remains (as always) to make a difference in the lives of children in the Kalabonkoro neighborhood of Bamako, Mali, by coordinating the sponsorship of 55 students to attend Youchaou's School. These are children who would otherwise be unable to attend school at all. The school has grown from a small apartment to a large complex housing all grades as well as a kindergarten, vocational school, library, and a high school. These children are given the tools to become better equipped to make a difference for their families, their community and their country. It has grown to be considered one of the best schools in Mali!

Youchaou has touched the lives of all who know him. He visits Oneonta periodically and hopefully you will all have the chance to meet him. He has given sermons and talks at our church and we hold banquets in his honor. He visits local schools and colleges. He has spent time with the children in our RE program.

I want to celebrate this relationship each year by letting our young UU's know the difference children made by helping us reach out across the ocean to Youchaou's school. We remember how, when we first corresponded with Youchaou, his few classes had only one box of colored pencils to share between them. For instance if someone needed the green pencil they might have to borrow it from another classroom. The RE children of 2006 wrote letters to children at the school. They made artwork to sell during coffee hour to send money to the school. We continue to assist him in any way we can. There will be a fundraiser for his school on March 23rd featuring a delicious Kenyan banquet. There will be a short filmed conversation with Youchaou from his visit to Oneonta last summer. For reservations call (607) 433-1272. All proceeds are donated to Youchaou's School.

For this worship service we talked about living conditions in Youchaou's neighborhood. We spoke of some of the ways we may be different and also ways we are all the same. We learned more general information about Africa such as that Africa is not a country but made of 54 countries. I read my favorite Anansi the spider story, Anansi and the Moss Covered Rock. For snack we tried some of the delicious fruits that Anansi tried to trick away from his neighbors in the story. Many of the children knew other Anansi stories. They learned that these are some of the many stories that come from West Africa. For our art project we made necklaces and bracelets using some of the beautiful beads Youchaou gave our RE program.

We sang the chorus of the song, "Across the Wide Ocean," by Sarah Pirtle:

*Across the wide ocean, across the wide ocean.
I hear you calling me, oh my friend.
I hear you calling me, oh my friend.*

RESTORATIVE PRACTICES FOR FAITH COMMUNITIES

Saturday, April 6, 2019 - 10:00 am to 4:00 pm

We are hosting this UUA Central Regional Group event and it will take place in our UUSO Sanctuary. Our regional contact, Rev. Evin is the facilitator!

Covenant is the silk that joins UU congregations, communities, and individuals together in a web of inter-connection. The practice of promising to walk together is the precious core of our creedless faith. But what do we do when covenants are broken? Restorative practices, which involve the skilled use of Circles, provide an opportunity to identify and address harms, restore relationships and mend community. Grounded in the practice of Compassionate Communication, this training will give an overview of restorative practices, skills and will include hands-on Circle exercises to use what you've learned. We especially encourage Youth Leaders, Committees on Ministry and Church Boards to attend. Restorative Practices are grounded in familiar practices: Youth Touch Groups, Covenant Groups, Chalice Circles, and respectful, direct, honest communication. For Youth and Adults!

SAWDUST FROM THE BOARD

The Board met on March 8 at 7pm via Zoom online conferencing. We approved the January minutes and reviewed staff and financial reports.

End of the Year Appeal

The Finance Committee informed the Board of the successful year end appeal and provided the disbursement numbers for those who donated to the "general" category. The chart listing the amounts donated to the appeal will be provided in a future newsletter.

Finances

The Finance Committee presented names of potential candidates for committee members. The Board agreed with the list under the condition that each candidate is a current UUSO member. The financial records are being updated during the transition to our new bookkeeper, Taylor Czyzewski. The Board will review updated statements during our March meeting. Board members have agreed to assist the Finance Committee with counting the collection plate after services.

Ministry Assessment on Worship

Five focus groups consisting of a total of over 20 member and friends of the congregation were facilitated by members of the Board and Committee on Ministry to answer four questions regarding our worship at UUSO using the appreciative inquiry model. The board nominated 3 members of the facilitation team to meet as a subcommittee to analyze the input obtained during this process and consider the conclusions we may draw from this process. We will be reporting the results to the entire congregation.

Sounding Board

Some questions revolved around communication within our congregation, namely whether we will still receive notification of the upcoming service details during the week. The answer is yes, this will continue. Also, there is concern that those not at the service each Sunday miss the Joys and Concerns. We will consider possibilities for helping these members and friends feel better connected with what is shared.

Next Board Meeting:

Our next BOT meeting will be on Wednesday, March 27, 2019 at 6:30pm in the Sanctuary. Congregants are welcome to observe. We will hold the Sounding Board on Sunday, March 24 after the service to hear any comments, questions, or concerns to be brought to the Board.

SPRING CHALICE CIRCLE

Rev. Craig will be facilitating a short-term Chalice Circle this Spring quarter. Chalice Circles are also known as Covenant Groups and Small Group Ministry. This Chalice Circle is open to anyone who would like to get to know others in our community while exploring our spiritual depths. Those experienced with Small Group Ministry and those considering it for the first time are equally welcome. We'll start with a brief, structured check-in, then share a reading on a chosen topic, and then have an attentive discussion of the topic. The Chalice Circles will take place on Fridays from 10a - 11:30a on 4/12, 4/19, 4/26, 5/10, 5/17, 5/31, 6/7, and 6/14, and will meet in the OBH Parlor/Mara Kern Library. It is important that participants commit to coming to at least 6 of the 8 sessions. The Chalice Circle will be limited to 10 participants.
