MINISTER'S MUSINGS

Black Lives Matter Rededication & Recommitment!

Our new Black Lives Matter banner has arrived and will be installed over our Chapin Memorial Sanctuary entrance the weekend of June 8th-9th. After the worship service that Sunday, we will gather to rededicate the new banner and to recommit ourselves to being an anti-racism, anti-oppression congregation. Members and friends of UUSO of all ages are invited to attend and participate. Guests from the wider community that share our commitment to this work are being invited to join us for this celebration.

Beware of Church Scam Attempts

According to reports from my colleagues and from the UU Money Digest group, there are several scams going around specifically targeting members of congregations. One scam uses an email sent from a church leader (the minister or the Board President) that claims to be in a situation where they need some money quickly. (Car breaks down, doctor visit copay, etc.) In another, an email is sent from the church office or minister asking the person to pay for a gift card for some person in need, with a convenient link you can click to make the donation.

If you receive a request for funds from myself or another church leader, it is likely to be a scam. While I have solicited funds from members for folks in need, I will never do so with a "link" you can click in the email. And I always ask for a return email confirming your intent. If you are ever in doubt, please call or text the person the email is supposedly from and make sure.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

"The insect in the plant, the moth which spends its brief hours of existence hovering about the candle's flame - nay, the life which inhabits a drop of water, is as much an object of God's special providence as the mightiest monarch on his throne." —Henry Bergh (1813-1888)

UUSO Religious Education classes often hold up Unitarian Henry Bergh as an example of someone who made a difference in the lives of animals and children. He founded the American Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in 1866. He went on in 1875 to found the first child protection organization in the United States, the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Both Explorers and Hogwarts classes discussed Henry Bergh's work on Sunday, May 10.

They also brought in some animal guests. The Hogwarts class hosted Clifford the albino corn snake, Khan the cat, and guinea pigs Chip and Teddy. The Explorers class had a visiting litter of kittens. Everyone enjoyed being with these animals and talking about their care. Teagan and Aubrey's family just got some horses. Amelia W. had two dogs. Charlotte also had a dog. There were many more pets among them all than just those visiting!

The kittens were named Bo(hemian), Rhapsody, Radio Ga Ga, Fat Bottom Girl, Champion and (perhaps you guessed) Queen. They were already named when they were taken in to foster by Amelia MC's family. She told us they had only had them for a month. They were currently 7 weeks old. The Susquehanna SPCA had rescued the litter from living in the wild with a feral mother. Amelia's family was to help the kittens learn about people to get them ready for adoptions into people's homes. Amelia W's family had also fostered rescue animals. They and others had adopted rescued pets.

The Explorers and Hogwarts classes visited each other to get to know all the pets. The nursery group visited the Explorers and played with kittens. All were very gentle with all the pets as they talked about animals in their lives and how to best take care of them.

There were still some children interacting with the pets when the class was over. Everyone lay on the floor on their backs, cuddling with the kittens. They called it "cat yoga".

BOOK & PLANT SALE




MEMORIAL BOOKS ON DISPLAY MAY 26


