The Promise and the Practice of Our Faith Update

During Sunday's (2/4) service, we took a 2nd collection for The Promise and the Practice of Our Faith campaign. This campaign is our Unitarian Universalist Associations effort to financially support the Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism. Our association is committed to fighting racism and white-supremacy in our institutions. Unfortunately, in past couple of years, we've come to realize that our own faith tradition is also acting in ways that support white supremacy. This should not have come as a surprise-- this is true for almost all institutions in our society. But, it is hard to notice when it has been our shared reality for so many years. As I've said before, the fish doesn't know it is wet. And so, the Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism are working with our UUA leaders to restructure and change our policies and practices to make us more friendly to all races and all marginalized people. They are working to help us close the gap between our ideals and principles and the reality we live in and co-create.

In the 2nd collection, we raised \$585. We will continue to accept donations in the UUSO office for the rest of February. If we manage to raise our donation to \$1,800, there is a matching grant that will double our contribution. 

UUSO COFFEE HOST BRIGADE

We are once again going to try a new way to get coffee hosts for Sundays at UUSO. We have formed the Coffee Host Brigade. So far seven people have signed up.

This entails doing coffee hour about three times per quarter. That works out to about once a month. You can choose to do coffee hour by yourself or with a partner. Some people partner by dividing the tasks so that one person brings all the food and the other person does all the work. And some people partner by each person bringing some of the food and doing some of the work. Coffee hours don't have to be elaborate—something sweet (cookies or cake, etc.), something not sweet (bagels or cheese and crackers, etc.), some fruit and/or vegetables, milk, half and half, and juice. Reimbursement is available.

The time has come for our Stewardship Campaign to begin! We'd like to share a little bit about what will be happening in the next few weeks.

On Sunday, February 11th, we will hand out the pledge packets in church. Please review the packet which has helpful information and thoughts on the importance of Stewardship for the UUSO. Pledge packets will be mailed to those not in attendance on February 11.^{th.} If you have any questions about pledging, please contact a member of the Stewardship Committee who will be happy to help you.

February 18th will be **Pledge Celebration Sunday**. We would be grateful if you could take a week and reflect on what amount you feel comfortable pledging and return your pledge form during the service that day. We will hold a **Pledge Celebration Potluck** after the service. Please plan to attend the potluck even if you have not yet pledged. It takes time for some folks to feel comfortable with what they will give. Come and enjoy the food and company!

Our goal as the Stewardship Committee this year is to try to get 95% participation in pledging. Last year only 70% made pledges. We have two anonymous donors who have promised to each give \$1,000 more to their pledge if we reach our goal of 95% participation. Please help us to make our goal and to help support the ministries and programs of our church. With your pledges we hope to create a balanced budget for 2018-2019 and to continue making a positive impact on our church, our community and the world.

If you are not comfortable committing to a pledge and would rather make a one-time donation, that option is available to you. If you come to church occasionally and usually just put some money in the collection plate, why not consider using our new "pledge envelopes" which will be conveniently located for you to pick up on your way into the sanctuary. Place your cash offering in the envelope, write your name on the envelope and receive credit toward your pledge. Your pledge, *no matter how modest*, will help us in planning our budget and shaping our dreams.

OUR MINISTRY WITHIN AND BEYOND OUR WALLS

In 2017, our congregation performed many acts of ministry within and beyond our wall. Here are some highlights of the UUSO ministries' accomplishments made possible by your pledges and service:

- Served approximately 732 meals during the five Saturdays we worked at Saturday's Bread.
- Donated over 300 pounds of clothing, blankets and other household goods to Salvation Army and Family Services after the Fall Rummage Sale
- Supported the international social justice work of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee through the Guest at Your Table collection and the Social Action Team's Plates for Peace fundraiser for Syrian refugees in Croatia
- Facilitated 5 Small Group Ministries
- Made our meeting spaces available for 12 local non-profit organizations
- Rev. Craig's pastoral care visits included 25 in person visits, 8 walk-n-talks, 23 phone calls, 22 office visits, 8 on-line or text sessions. Many members and friends also provided pastoral care through visits and calls.
- Sponsored 52 students and funded other expenses at the Youchaou School in Bamako, Mali
- Provided holiday gifts to 4 families (which included 11 children and 7 adults) through the Family Services Adopt-A-Family program
- Our Religious Education Program provided education and childcare to 35 children with the support of 16 volunteer teachers and caregivers
- Offered 2 anti-racism presentations to the community
- Through our weekly Change for Change collection, funds were distributed to 16 local non-profit organizations
- Donated food and toiletries for children and families served by the Regional Foodbank and the Family Services Association through the Backpack Buddies and Personal Care Items collections coordinated by the Social Action Team
- The UUSO endowment funded 9 proposals for local organizations, projects, and unfunded nonoperational UUSO expenses
- Provided information about social justice issues to the community through the Social Action Team's monthly film series
- Our members and friends supported women's and LGBTQ social justice issues through the Tri-County Women's Coalition and Otsego Pride Alliance
- The Social Action Team coordinated 7 petitions on social justice issued signed by members and friends
- An Energy Audit for UUSO buildings revealed positive evidence of our energy conservation
- Through our fundraisers, the Book Sale, Auction, Cookies and Crafts and the Rummage and Plant Sale we supported our vision of sustainability, recycling, supported local artisans, offered affordable goods and social interaction to the community

COOKIES AND CRAFTS APPLICATIONS

- Cards made from recycled or tree-free paper (this will be indicated on the card)

- Consider sending an e-card instead using one of the many quality services around.

- Fair trade and/or organic chocolate

- Choose organic and/or locally grown flowers

- Make a donation to an environmental organization on behalf of the person.

– If you wish to give jewelry, consider pre-owned or purchasing from jewelers who are certified to be sourcing precious metals and gemstones in an ecologically and socially responsible manner. Or considering something really offbeat like a wooden ring – they look amazing.

- Buy the person a gift certificate for holistic therapies e.g. massage, naturopath, health spa.
