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MINISTER'S MUSINGS

And The Children Shall Lead...

Like many of you, I reacted to the news of the school shooting in Parkland, FL with a mixture of deep sadness, horror, and anger. "Oh, no. Not again." Mass shootings have become a common occurrence in our country and it is hard to know how to react anymore. I've lost count of how many rallies I've attended and spoken at. I've got files of pastoral prayers that I've read from the pulpit. I've called and written and emailed our legislators. As have many of you. Our outrage and our tears do not seem to be having any effect on those who claim to represent us. It is easy to slip into despair and inaction in the face of this ongoing horror.

But after the news of the shooting, after the predictable deflections and empty statements of support from our representatives, something else happened. The students from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School joined together and found their voices. As one of them said in a statement to the media, "The children at Sandy Hook were too young to speak or to even understand what happened to them. We will speak for them and for all of the children that have lost their lives to gun violence." The students have taken to twitter, facebook, and other social media. They have set up a media center in a nearby park to give interviews to any reporter that cares to listen. They have followed the example of the Women's March and are calling on nation wide events over the next few months. These youth are doing exactly what needs to be done. They give me hope. They inspire me. And I want to offer whatever assistance and support I can to them-- and to all youth who take up their cause.

At the same time, I know several members of our congregation are looking for a way to address this issue. The Social Action Team is planning at least one letter writing event. As we find out more, we will let the congregation know. Let's do what we can to end this ongoing tragedy of gun violence. The problem is complicated-- but that is no excuse for doing nothing.

Movie With the Minister

Join me for an afternoon movie, Black Panther, the newest Marvel superhero movie on Sunday, March 4th. (The time will be determined once they post the show times.) The movie is rated PG-13 and includes violence and guns. Black Panther was the first black superhero created by Marvel comics. The movie stays true to its roots and focus on the the fictional African nation of Wakanda. The portrayal of a country that was never colonized, is rich with resources and African culture, and is technologically advanced is inspiring. The sets, costumes, and music are all award-worthy. I believe this is one of the best superhero movies I've seen. No RSVP is necessary. I'll post a gathering time once we know when the film is showing.

Spirit-Full Wednesday

Starting in March, I plan on hosting a monthly discussion on spiritual topics on the first Wednesday night of every month. I have no format in mind and no curriculum. My plan is to announce a topic and invite people to join me for an hour or so to discuss it. We'll start at 6 p.m. and we'll go no later than 8pm People are welcome to come and stay for as little or as much time as they like. All ages are welcome and encouraged to attend. If childcare is needed, I will arrange for it (please let me

The Seekers Sunday School Class (4th and 5th Graders) meet most Sunday mornings to work with their Popcorn Theology curriculum. The class uses clips from movies to delve into topics about ethics, morality, and our Unitarian Universalist Seven Principles. On February 25th they will have a lesson called, “Where Dreams Come True”, and watch parts of the movie, Field of Dreams. They’ll look at their own aspirations and why they are important. They’ll explore the quest for meaning in our lives and how we can respect and support each other’s quests although they can be different from our own.

I’m excited to say we have received some new lessons for this class that include some of the following films with their special focus in parenthesis:

- The Princess Bride (love/true love, justice vs. revenge, and hope)
- Kiki’s Delivery Service (believing in yourself, what makes a job vs. what makes a “calling”)
- Mulan (identity, truth, gender roles/expectations)
- Wall-E (First and Seventh UU Principles, compassion and respect)
- Up! (accepting loss, letting go, love and adventure)

Many a snowy Sunday morning they’ve trekked over to the nearby Olympia Brown House to visit their “Special Spot”. They are filling their Web of Life journals with observations about the temperature, changes in plant and animal life, and beautiful sketches. Their upcoming classes will include: Rain and Snow and the Web of Life; Uniqueness; and Litters and Runts.

Both classes will enjoy “Pet Day” on March 25. Children are invited to bring their gentle pet guests. Pets must have a leash or a container. Please let me know if your child plans to bring a guest pet so I can be sure there are enough pets. I can always bring my own if needed. It also helps me arrange the classrooms so the pets will be comfortable.

The Experiences with the Web of Life curriculum is a wonderful way to explore our UU Seventh Principle. As with Popcorn Theology all seven principles are woven throughout.

Here is a children’s version of the UU Seven Principles from the Tapestry of Faith curriculum:

1. We believe that each and every person is important.
2. We believe that all people should be treated fairly and kindly.
3. We believe that we should accept one another and keep on learning together.
4. We believe that each person must be free to search for what is true and right in life.
5. We believe that all persons should have a vote about the things that concern them.
6. We believe in working for a peaceful, fair, and free world.
7. We believe in caring for our planet Earth, the home we share with all living things.,

UUSO COFFEE HOST BRIGADE

We are once again going to try a new way to get coffee hosts for Sundays at UUSO. We have formed the Coffee Host Brigade. So far seven people have signed up.

This entails doing coffee hour about three times per quarter. That works out to about once a month. You can choose to do coffee hour by yourself or with a partner. Some people partner by dividing the tasks so that one person brings all the food and the other person does all the work. And some people partner by each person bringing some of the food and doing some of the work. Coffee hours don't have to be elaborate—something sweet (cookies or cake, etc.), something not sweet (bagels or cheese and crackers, etc.), some fruit and/or vegetables, milk, half and half, and juice. Reimbursement is available.

PETITION AND "THE TIMES OF HARVEY MILK"

San Francisco Mayor George Moscone and Board of Supervisor member Harvey Milk were allies--and rising stars in the national Democratic Party at the time of their assassination by Dan White, a straight, white fireman with police connections. (Moscone was liked for President and Milk for U.S. Senate). Under California law since enacted, part of White's implied defense --gay panic -- would not be allowed today. This year, on February 5, Governor Andrew Cuomo announced support for pending legislation banning a 'gay panic' defense in NY assault cases--and you can sign a petition banning this defense at the screening of *The Times of Harvey Milk* Wednesday, February 28th. The Last Wednesdays Film Series on Peace and Justice continues offering a vegetarian meal at 6:00 followed by screening at 7:00 with discussion thereafter--and childcare for those contacting church office (432-3491) by Monday February 26th.
